Originally approved by Rotary in 1911 as, "He Profits Most Who Serves Best", the phrase summarizes a philosophy of unselfish volunteer service. Over time, other mottos were suggested and in 1989, the Council on Legislation established "Service Above Self" as the principal motto of Rotary.

The phrase reminds Rotarians to think beyond selfish thoughts and consider how they can help others. It's a powerful call to action, emphasizing the importance of selfless service for the greater good.

What does "Service Above Self" mean to you?

Challenges arise when we consider the needs of our communities, the financial resources we have at hand, our expertise and our capacity to meet those needs. We may have differing opinions on priorities, on distribution of funds, on the way we go about the project. Tempers may rise, personalities may clash. That is when it is time to remind ourselves of our 4 way test: Of the things we think, say and do:



THE GIFT OF CLEAN WATER FROM DISTRICT 6330



Rotary Club of Stratford's Aqua Box Program

With March being Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Month in the Rotary year I thought I would take advantage and update you on the Aquabox program being operated by The Rotary Club of Stratford.

Did you know that for as little as \$30.00 you can provide a family with up to a year's worth of clean drinking water at a time of disaster? Aquabox is a simple gravity fed means of purifying water. Each unit contains two silver impregnated ceramic filters and these filters remove 99.9999% of bacteria and particles as small as .3 microns. Each Aquabox also contains bars of soap, toothbrushes and toothpaste and a solar rechargeable light.

The Aquabox program was started by the Rotary Club of Wirksworth, England in 1992. Our program was started in 2006 after Past District Governor Jim Scott met one of the Wirksworth members while on vacation. Jim brought the idea back to the club and it has been a major program of our club ever since. To date we have built almost 15,000 Aquaboxes and they have gone to 18 countries ranging from A to V. Antigua to Vanuatu.

Like almost all programs, fundraising and controlling costs are key. We are very fortunate in that we have received District grants as well as our club, The Rotary Club of Stratford, donates \$5000.00 a year to the program. By working with the aid organization Global Medic all the Aquaboxes that we build are delivered to disaster locations around the world and Global Medic also supplies set up instructions on site. Last year we built one thousand Aquaboxes, the year before fifteen hundred. We'd like to meet the latter number again and you and your club can help. All funds go to building Aquaboxes so if your club needs a WASH project, please consider Aquabox. For a donation of \$300.00 or more we will put your club's name on the Aquaboxes you have funded. For a donation of \$1000.00 you and your club can help build them. All donations are gratefully accepted and if you want, we will do a presentation for your club, either virtually or if within a reasonable driving distance, in person.

So remember Aquabox... A gift of clean water-A gift of life.

District Grants can provide up to \$3000USD and can support projects such as:

- Local or international service projects.
- Scholarships for any educational level.
- Youth Projects, Rotary Friendship Exchange.
- Microcredit activities when working with a registered microfinance institution that has operated for at least three years to administer loan programs.



If your club is qualified and your District Grant Application is approved, you could receive \$3000 back in grant funds on a \$9000USD project. So, start some conversations with your club members. 

District Treasurer- What's Involved?

The District Finance Committee supervises district funds by reviewing and studying the amount of per capita levy and district administration expenses. It also prepares annual reports on the status of the district's finances. The district treasurer serves on this committee RESPONSIBILITIES •In cooperation with the Governor Elect, create a district budget for consideration by clubs and approval by PE's at the ABM •Review and recommend the amount of per capita levy •Ensures accounts are promptly paid •Ensure proper records are kept by district for all District committees •Prepare annual financial reports for the District

QUALIFICATIONS You are a Rotarian in good standing, and must be a member in a club of District 6330. You are experienced in finance or business accounting procedures and the handling of funds. Ideally, you have an accounting designation of some type. You have a keen eye for detail and like ensuring things are in order. TERM OF OFFICE:

One year minimum, preferably three years.



The Newsletter editor compiles and prepares the stories and articles for the monthly district newsletter.

RESPONSIBILITIES:

Solicit newsworthy items and information from the District Governor, RI, the District Leadership Team, and the District clubs.

Create layout and design in a professional format, consistent with Rotary International branding.

Submit draft in advance of publication to the District Governor for approval.

Distribute Newsletter electronically once a month on a date determined by the District Governor.

Provide the Newsletter to the District Webmaster to upload to the website.

QUALIFICATIONS:

Working knowledge of graphics software, ie Canva, or other

Experience in writing or preparing documents and editing written documents.

Experience in formatting and editing photos and graphics.

TERM OF OFFICE:

One year minimum, preferably three years.

The Public Image/ Relations committee

RESPONSIBILITIES:

•Develop and implement a district public image program that will promote Rotary to the media, community leaders and beneficiaries of Rotary's programs
